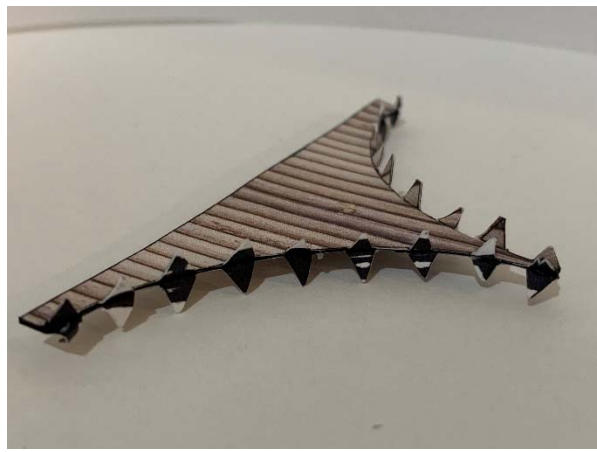


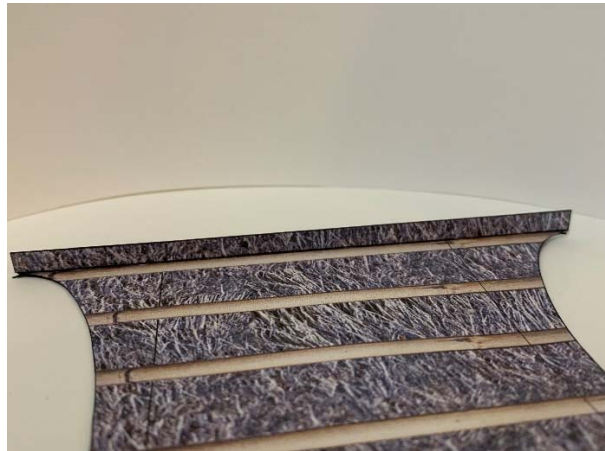
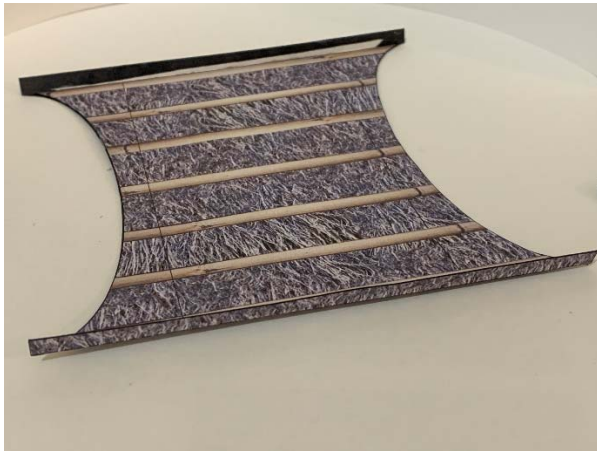
Instructions for the 'Drunken Tiki' Bar

Step 1 – Thatched Roof

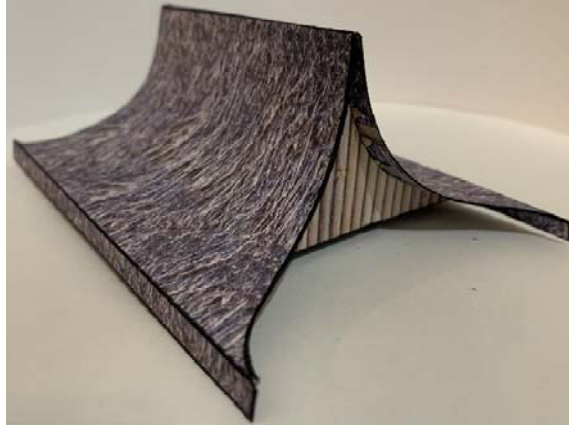
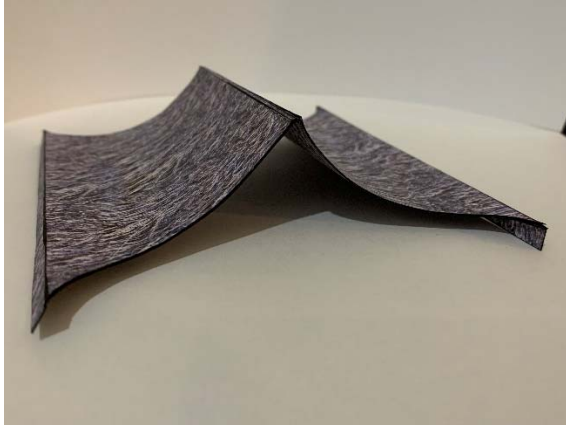
Cut out the inner and outer roof parts and the two curved roof supports. Fold the roof supports in half and glue together.



Now, glue the top and bottom roof sections together. Once dry, glue the two side strips to the black areas shown in the first picture, one to each side. It should look like the second picture when done.



Now find something round and smooth, a large marker, a dowel rod, etc. Slowly roll the each side on the top so that the roof curves inward rather than form a V shape, See the first picture below. Once both sides are curved, take the two ends you previously assembled and align them with the thin, black line on the inside of the roof and glue in place. It should look like the second picture below.



Now find the black roof support pole. Fold in half and glue. When dry, edge glue to the top (peak) of the roof as shown below.



Step 2 – The Support Poles and Base

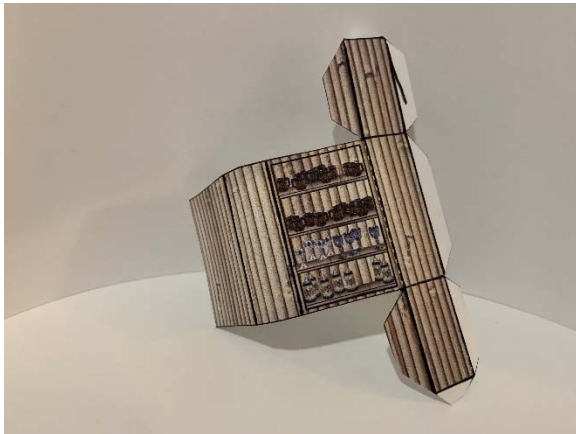
Take the bamboo support pieces and carefully roll each one around a pencil or pen then glue the tab to form a cylinder. Glue the four poles into the corners of the roof part. Once dry, glue the roof and poles assembly to the wooden-textured floor panel, centering it.



(Ignore the interior parts in the second picture, They are installed in the next step)

Step 3 – The Interior

This part is really simple, the bar, the shelf and the stools are all simple boxes. Just cut out, edge, fold and glue the tabs and you have the bar interior parts. The only 'trick' to the bar is that the top is a bit wider than the base so when it is glued it has an overhang.



Now glue the shelving unit to the back of the bar (either side can be back, they are identical), aligned with the roof poles. The bar glues to roughly centered amid the four poles. The stools glue to the floor tile in front of the bar.



Step 4 – The Tiki Pole

Last but not least, the tiki pole itself, the namesake of the bar. Cut out the tiki and assemble it into a cylinder by rolling around a thicker cylinder like the roof in step 1. Glue the side, then glue the lid to the tabs. Now, if you want the tiki to stand up straight, set it aside for now. If you want it to lean, cut out the semi-circular cut line on the base of the tiki and then see how it fits against a flat surface (may require trimming to get the angle you prefer and a flush fit).

Now take the two sand texture blocks. Cut them into a rough shape like a pile of sand, making sure the top one fits on the bottom one. Glue these to a couple pieces of edged cardstock and cut out (this makes it thicker and easy to see). Glue the two sand layers together, then edge glue the tiki pole to the sand. The assembled Tiki should resemble the second picture below when complete.



Step 5 – Final Assembly

And now, bringing it all together! Take the sand base sheet. Glue the tiki bar to the sand sheet, the white box shows the location. The Tiki can be placed anywhere you like on the sand sheet, mine is a bit to one side and angled.



Finished!

You have finished the Drunken Tiki! It is now ready for you to use in your tabletop games. I hope you enjoyed the build!
